

Oklahoma Baptists Equip Churches to Pray for Missionaries by Messenger Staff

SANCTITY OF HUMAN LIFE SUNDAY 2025

In January 1984, President Ronald Reagan designated the third Sunday of January as National Sanctity of Human Life Day. Since then, pastors, churches and prolife organizations across the United States have been using this day to bring awareness to the ongoing battle against abortion. This year, Sanctity of Human Life Sunday (SOHLS) falls on Jan. 19. SOHLS, along with Rose Day, places an urgent focus on promoting the sanctity of human life, protecting unborn children with the goal to bring legalized abortion to an end.

Each year, Oklahoma Baptists partner with Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children (OBHC) to create helpful and impactful resources that churches can use to spread awareness and observe SOHLS. These resources include an updated 2025 Pastor's Preaching Guide and Information Resource, a new bulletin insert and promotional videos that can be shown during worship services.

Included in front of the guide is a letter from Oklahoma Baptists Executive Director-Treasurer Todd Fisher and OBHC President James Swain that asks churches and pastors to set aside time to recognize SHOLS.

"We are living in times in which Biblical principles are under attack," the letter says. "One of those principles is the Biblical teaching of the Sanctity of Human Life, that life is valuable from the womb to the end of life. That is why we are asking you, once again, to set aside Sanctity of Human Life Sunday, January 19, 2025, as a key time to lead your church in standing for life."

This year's preaching guide and information resource contains sermons from pastors across the state that emphasize the value of life and God's workmanship that is human life. The sermons included are as follows:

—"*God's Wonderful Workmanship*" by Michael Butler, Pastor at Chickasha, First

—"A Gift Realized" by Tristan Martin, Pastor at Norman

—*"Defining Life and Love"* by Kenny Mossman, Pastor at Carnegie, First

—"A Baby's Cry that was Never Heard" by Walter Wilson, Pastor at Lawton, Friendship

—"*Valuing Life Like God Does*" by Heath Tucker, Pastor at Edmond, Waterloo Road


The testimony of Mandi Parkhurst, Director of Hope Pregnancy Center Edmond, is also included in the guide. Additionally, Falls Creek Program Director Todd Sanders created a Sunday School or Small Group lesson plan titled "Imago Dei." This lesson emphasizes that everyone is made in God's image and how we can live out the image of God.

In 2022, a major victory was won in the battle against abortion with the overturning of *Roe v. Wade*. This overturning made abortion a states' rights issue rather than a federal constitutional right. In the same year on May 25, Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt signed HB 4327 into law which prohibited "the performance of abortion except under certain conditions" (HB 4327). Yet, the fight against abortion nationwide is raging. SHOLS is important because it shows the unity of churches, pastors and congregations across the nation against abortion and for life.

A few weeks ago, I was on campus and did not see him. I learned he had gone home because of how well he had done with us. I reached out to his pastor to check on him, and the response of the pastor was such a blessing. He said, "He came home a different young man!" He shared with me how appreciative the family is and the impact of his testimony on the church and asked me to come and preach and share about our work. Their experience has opened the eyes of the church to our work and has reminded me of the vital partnership between the ministry of Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children (OBHC) and the churches of our state.

FIRST PERSON: A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A MILITARY CHAPLAIN SERVING GOD IN THE SKIES AND ON THE GROUND

Sunday morning, I preached an expository sermon from 1 Peter on living as resident foreigners and enduring hardships for the sake of Christ. I began by leading our congregation in prayer for persecuted believers in Sudan. Afterward, we enjoyed a fellowship lunch where I introduced three new Airmen to some of our retirees—men and women who were serving long before these young Airmen were born.

This might sound like a typical day for any Baptist pastor, but for a military chaplain, it's just the beginning.

Monday, I joined a training mission with a flying unit aboard a HH-60 Pave Hawk helicopter. Before takeoff, I spent time talking with five aircrew members about their families and adjusting to life at our base. As we prepared to depart, the pilot turned to me and asked, "Chap, you want to say a prayer for our flight?" "Absolutely," I replied, praying over the mission and crew.

During the flight, we trained at a gun range where Special Mission Aviators fired a .50-caliber machine gun at old tanks and vehicles. Later, while practicing combat landings, I spotted an elk running through the forest. "Elk at 3 o'clock!" I called out, and to my surprise, the pilot turned the aircraft, giving the crew a moment to marvel at God's creation before we resumed training.

Back at the hangar, a young maintainer stopped by my office. "Got a minute, chaplain?" he asked. "You bet!" I replied. Within moments, we were discussing deep struggles—relationships, grief, struggles at work, or thoughts of suicide. In these confidential conversations, God often uses chaplains to restore hope and help service members reconnect to Him.

This is just a glimpse of the life of a military chaplain—a unique ministry that touches lives on the ground and in the skies. If you've ever wondered what this calling looks like, I invite you to watch <u>this short video</u>.

OKLAHOMA BAPTISTS EQUIP CHURCHES TO PRAY FOR MISSIONARIES

Each year, Oklahoma Baptists produce a Cooperative Program (CP) Missionary Prayer Guide, which features various missionaries serving around the world.

The 2025 (CP) Missionary Prayer Guide is now available online at <u>www.oklahomabaptists.org</u>, even as print copies are being sent to churches across the state in coming days.

The purpose of the prayer guide is to unify Oklahoma Baptists to pray for missionaries throughout the year, including lifting up their specific prayer points that were given by the missionaries themselves. Each week, a specific individual or family serving on the mission field is highlighted, while some weeks feature various missions topics and focal points.

Todd Fisher, Oklahoma Baptists' executive directortreasurer, said, "The Lord has taught me so many life lessons about the power of prayer. When God's people pray, we are acknowledging our total dependence upon Him. This year marks the 100th anniversary of the Cooperative Program, and this 2025 Oklahoma Baptists' Cooperative Program (CP) Missionary Prayer Guide is an excellent tool to help you pray for others who are supported through the CP."

The missionaries featured in the 2025 CP Missionary Prayer Guide can be:

•Highlighted in a worship service, Sunday School class or any prayer ministry, as PowerPoint slides of each missionary are available to download online.

•Sent a note of encouragement by email, as Oklahoma Baptists are given a contact point to connect with the missionaries directly


•Shared on social media, church newsletters or elsewhere.

One section of the guide prompts individuals to pray for missionaries serving in secure countries. "Pray for the Oklahoma Baptists who are serving through the International Mission Board in areas of the world that are so dangerous we cannot reveal their names or where they serve, not just for the safety of these missionaries, but for those under their care who choose to follow Jesus. The majority of these workers serve in countries where other religions and spiritism are deeply entrenched in the cultures. These are some of the greatest challenges to overcome," said the Prayer Guide.

Missionaries featured in this resource all have a connection to Oklahoma, and the Prayer Guide lists their church connection points. In addition to individuals, the Prayer Guide details various topical areas of missions importance that churches could lift up in prayer, church planting connections, ministries and more.

"By praying for the individuals and ministries found in this (resource), you will be joining many others who, through intercessory prayer, will unite in partnering and laboring together for the cause of Christ throughout the world," Fisher added.
